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MOKE EXPORTS EXPAND

Leyland Australia's versatile Moke has established its 82nd export market--thanks to the King of Morocco.

His Royal Majesty, King Hassan II of Morocco, has ordered three left hand drive Mokes.

The order was signed by the King's son, Prince Moulay Abdallah, who gave the direct delivery address as "The Royal Palace, Rabat, Morocco."

The Moke, which is manufactured only in Australia, has now been exported to 82 countries.

It has found ready acceptance in Africa, the Middle East and Europe, the West Indies, the Pacific, Central and South America and South East Asia.

Experimental exercises are being carried out at the moment to test the possibility of assembling Mokes in several Asian territories.

Since Moke exports began to South East Asia in 1967, they have been sent to the Philippines, Hong Kong, Singapore, Taiwan, Thailand, Ceylon, India, Bangla Desh, Laos and Java.

The Moke was designed as a general purpose vehicle, built for a multitude of jobs, from carrying people to pieces of pipeline.
